Practice Standards for Participation

Child voice and child participation is central to Save the Children's work. It is essential to a commitment towards locally-led action and shifting the power to children and communities.

Save the Children defines participation as having the opportunity to express a view, influence decisionmaking and achieving change. Children's participation is an informed and willing involvement of all children, particularly those who are marginalised whose voices may often not be heard, and those of different ages and abilities, in any matter concerning them either directly or indirectly. In its participation work, Save the Children follows seven practice standards:

- 1. An ethical approach: transparency, honesty and accountability
- 2. Children's participation is relevant and voluntary
- 3. A child-friendly, enabling environment
- 4. Equality of opportunity
- 5. Staff are effective and confident
- 6. Participation promotes the safety and protection of children
- 7. Ensuring follow-up and evaluation
